Mallard Lake





LOCATION – Mallard Lake is in Hanover Park, in Dupage County. Parking lot is off of Schick Road west of Gary Avenue.

DESCRIPTION – Mallard Lake is an 89 acre man-made lake with a maximum depth of 25 feet owned by the Forest Preserve District of Dupage County (FPDDC). The lake is managed under a cooperative management agreement with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. There is an island with bridges connecting two sides of the lake. There are two handicapped accessible fishing piers and several access paths. Carry in watercraft are allowed with permit (see reverse side). No gasoline powered motors allowed. A smaller 9 acre pond (Cloverdale Pond) is also accessible at Mallard Lake Forest Preserve.

MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES – Muskie are stocked at a rate of one fish per acre, every other year. This fish community is surveyed every four years while trap-net surveys targeting muskie take place each spring. A 60-minute "spring" electrofishing survey took place on June 5th, 2020. This survey took place five weeks later due to restrictions associated with COVID-19. Water temperature had already hit 78.6°F, typically water temperature is in the mid 50's for our spring surveys.

*New regulations for FPDDC lakes and ponds take effect April 1st, 2017.

STATUS OF THE SPORT FISHERY – Mallard Lake offers quality fishing opportunities Largemouth Bass, Walleye, and Muskie! A variety of forage species include; Yellow Perch, Gizzard Shad, Bluegill, Pumpkinseed, Green Sunfish, White Sucker, Golden Shiner, and Bluntnose Minnows.

Largemouth Bass – Largemouth Bass were caught at a rate of 63 fish per hour. This rate is in line with the management goal of 60 fish per hour. Bass ranged in length from 4.7 to 17.7 inches, with average bass measuring 10.4 inches. Thirty-three percent of the bass were longer than 12 inches, while only 6% of the sample were over 15 inches.

Bluegill and Panfish – As in previous years, bluegill catch rate was low at 53 fish per hour. In previous years, fish over 6 inches were not present. Eleven percent of the Bluegill in this sample were longer than six inches. Other species contribute to the panfish fishery at Mallard to make up for a lack of Bluegill. Pumpkinseed, Black Crappie, and Yellow Perch are all present in the lake and large individuals of those species are present. One Black Crappie over 10 inches was caught in this survey and Yellow Perch over the nine-inch minimum length limit have been caught in previous years' spring trap-nets.

Muskellunge – The IDNR began biennial stocking of Muskie in 2006, adding fish at a rate of one fish per acre (≈90 fish) every other year. The largest Muskie captured in IDNR trap-netting was in 2013 and the fish measured 45 ½ inches and weighed 18.8 pounds. Anglers report catches of larger fish. The spring trap-net survey did not occur in 2020 but will resume in 2021. Annual trap-net catch has been variable through since 2012, but typically stays around the one fish per net night management goal.

Walleye – Walleye are stocked annually or biennially and fish over 21 inches have been observed every year in spring trap-net surveys. Anglers may harvest three walleye over 16 inches per day.


Northern Pike - Northern pike are no longer being stocked. Northern Pike up to 27 inches have been caught in Spring trap-net surveys.

Channel Catfish – Channel catfish are stocked sporadically. Lack of channel catfish catch in our surveys suggests high angler harvest or low sampling gear efficiency.
