



# FOX CHAIN O LAKES

## FISHERIES STATUS SUMMARY

**LOCATION** – 50 miles northwest of Chicago off Ill. Rt. 173 and U.S. Rt. 12 near the cities of Antioch, Fox Lake and McHenry.

**DESCRIPTION** – The Fox Chain O’ Lakes are unique from other major water bodies in the state in that they were formed by glaciers thousands of years ago and their depth is maintained by a lock and dam system south of McHenry. The system is composed of 9 major lakes interconnected by channels, the Fox Chain O’ Lakes is classified as a public navigable waterway managed under the authority of the Department of Natural Resources and the Fox Waterway Agency to provide a variety of water oriented recreational activities. Total - 7110.0 acres above the Stratton Dam, 1100 acres between the Algonquin and Stratton dams, Lake Catherine 149.5 acres; Channel Lake 348.5 acres; Lake Marie 585.0 acres; Bluff Lake 92.4 acres; Grass Lake 1451.4 acres; Petite Lake 234.5 acres; Fox/Nippersink Lake 2376.8 acres; Pistakee Lake 1715.7 acres. **State owned FREE boat ramps available at Chain O Lakes State Park**, private (for fee) launches available throughout the system. Concessions are available at Chain O Lakes State Park and the McHenry Dam offering fishing boat and motor rental, canoe/kayak rentals, live bait, tackle, ice, food, and soft drinks. Boat rentals, restaurants, bait/tackle and guide services are available via private vendors throughout the system. Fish cleaning facilities are NOT available in State Parks or at the McHenry Dam.

**MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES** - The Division of Fisheries has been actively monitoring the status of Fox Chain O’ Lakes fishery for over 60 years (1954 to present). We usually collect between 35 and 40 fish species during our Biennial fish surveys. Three fish species have voluntarily become established in the Fox Chain O Lakes; **yellow bass** (1973, then experienced significant die-offs in 1995 and 1997), **freshwater drum** (1992) and **gizzard shad** (2007). The State owns management jurisdiction for the Chain O Lakes and allows homeowners to treat vegetation in front of their homes by hiring a Licensed Commercial Applicator and obtaining a Letter of Permission (LOP) from the Division of Fisheries.

**STATUS OF THE SPORT FISHERY** – The Fox Chain is annually stocked with 243,000 2” walleye fingerlings, 2 million walleye fry, and around 3000 muskie fingerlings between State and Club Donations. Thirty four thousand 4” to 6” largemouth bass fingerlings are stocked every other year. Natural reproduction maintains all other species including northern pike.

**LARGEMOUTH BASS** – In 2015, bass were collected at a rate of 40 fish/hr compared to 28/hr in 2013 and 36.4 fish/hr in 2011. Fish measured from 2” - 19” long and weighed up to 3.8 lbs.; 51% of the bass collected were over 12” long and sexually mature, 25% exceeded 14 inches (legal size), 9% were over 15” long, 5% were over 16” long and 1% were over 18”. This is a well balanced population that supports quality panfish development and supports bass angling opportunities.

**WALLEYE** – The Chain O Lakes is a brood source for the State Hatchery System so it is managed to produce large walleye! During the biennial fall survey (2015), walleye were collected at a rate of 8 fish/hr compared to 18 fish/hr in 2013 (we really found them that year). Fish ranged from 3” to 27” long and weighed up to 7 lbs. In spring 2016, several 10+ and 11+ lb. fish were collected. In 2015 a 12+ lb. female was collected. All brood fish were returned to Lake Marie after being processed by the Hatchery! Fall data (2015), (n=110) indicated 68% of the walleye sampled exceeded 14” long, 39% were over 18” long and 11% of the sample was over 24” long. The slot regulation protects female fish and promotes harvest of males.

**Muskellunge** – Muskie are managed for high catch rates and the longevity of the stocking program has allowed females to grow LARGE! The average muskie is 36” long but fish up to 51” are caught and regularly reported. In the Chain, it takes at least 12 years for a muskie to reach 48” (legal length) and about 15 years to reach 51”+. Male muskie occasionally grow beyond 40” long but females easily grow through it and are the longest fish in a system. Muskie are surveyed each year, in spring nets, to track tagged fish and growth.

Females weighing over 30 lbs. are regularly collected with our largest ever weighing 36.2 lbs (in 2007!). There are some really nice fish in the Chain!!

**BLUEGILL** – In 2015, 36% of the bluegill collected (n=1199) were longer than 6” but these data vary greatly depending on the amount of vegetation present and sampled. Fish ranged from 1” to 8.5”, and topped the scale at 0.47 lbs.; 25% of the bluegill collected were over 7” long and 8% exceeded 8” long. Bluegills approaching 9.5” long were reported by a few lucky fishermen this fall!

**BLACK and WHITE CRAPPIE** – Both black crappie (n=36) and white crappie (n=59) were collected in 2015. Fish measured between 2” and 15” long and weighed up to 1.7 lbs.; 59% of black crappie and 87% of white crappie exceeded 9”, and 11% of black crappie and 30% of white crappie exceeded 11” long.

**CHANNEL CATFISH** – This species is maintained through natural reproduction and are common in river systems. Since the Chain is part of a river system these fish are a significant predator, relatively abundant and caught by a lot of fishermen. Channel catfish ranged in size from 10” to 28” long and weighed up to 7 lbs. In 2015, 59% of the channel catfish collected exceeded 18” in length, 50% were over 22” long and 11% were over 24” long. Flathead catfish are present but not common in the Chain O Lakes above the McHenry Dam but commonly targeted below the McHenry Dam south to Dayton.

**FISHING REGULATIONS** – Includes the Fox River from the Illinois State line to the Algonquin Dam. Trot line fishing is permitted.
